Commentary for the Readings in the Extraordinary Form: Third Sunday of Lent

"When (Jesus) cast out the devil, the dumb man spoke." But as indicated by the little whining group to the right, some complained: "By Beelzebub, the prince of devils, He casts out devils" (Gospel).

Formerly, on this day, candidates were examined in preparation for Baptism on Holy Saturday. The first effect of Baptism is to free the souls from the power of the devil. The *house* of which Jesus speaks is the human soul before His coming, degraded by idolatry, by sensuality, under the tyranny of the evil spirit.

Mary holding the Infant (pictured in the upper left corner) is a symbol of our Baptism. Mary gives birth to us as members of the Mystical Body of her Christ. Moreover, like her, "Blessed are they who hear the word of God and keep it" (Gospel).

These baptismal duties of *death to sin* and *life in God* (Epistle are meant to gladden, not to oppress the human heart (Offertory), intended by God for Divine possession (Communion Verse), safe from diabolical obsession.

Stewardship Moment


"You shall not carve idols for yourselves in the shape of anything..." - Exodus 20:4

STATIONAL CHURCHES

Third Sunday of Lent, Station with San Lorenzo fuori le Mura (St. Lawrence Outside the Walls):



The Station is in the basilica of St. Lawrence *outside the walls*—the walls being the old walls that marked the boundary and protected Rome. The name of this, the most celebrated of the martyrs of Rome, would

remind the catechumens that the faith they were about to profess would require them to be ready for many sacrifices. In the primitive Church, the third Sunday in Lent was called *Scrutiny Sunday*, because it was on this day that they began to examine the catechumens, who were to be admitted to Baptism on Easter night.

Greetings from the ICC Soup Kitchen!

Our Soup Kitchen ministry is busy, despite the number of guests dropping as the temperature has dropped. Ever since October, we have had fewer guests, but we consistently serve 250-350 meals a week. Some days, we have served 15 meals; other days we have served 100, usually on the weekends.

The Advent Calendar in which the parishes promoted and collected different items each day of Advent successfully filled our shelves with much needed food stuffs and even clothing. Your generosity and support was overwhelming and I want to thank each and every person who participated. We now have items we can use for the next several months as we know the first months of the year are traditionally slower months for donations. Our clothing ministry has kept our guests warm as people have given winter gear, some of it brand new, so we can provide some comfort to confront the cold.

Serving the needy is a ministry, and whether we serve 1 or 100, we never become disheartened for it is not in our power to control the weather or the number of people who come. It is the purpose of the ministry that guides us:

Whatever you do to the least of my brethren you do for me!

We are here ready and willing to serve anyone who comes to our church because each person is another Christ. This is God's ministry and the ones who come are the ones God wanted us to serve today. So, we pray before we serve our meals, and we pray afterwards, thanking God, Our Father, that we had the opportunity to serve the least, who somehow bring out the best in us.

Bringing out the best in ourselves invites us to do our best for others. As we know there are three pillars of stewardship: time, talent, and treasure. And as every other non-profit organization, we struggle with talented people giving their time and talent to our ministry. "The harvest is plenty, but the laborers are few."

We have a talented core group of volunteers who serve, but we seek others like you who have talents too. The struggle of course is your time. **An hour a day keeps**

the homeless alive today.

Right now, as I evaluate our ministry, in our kitchen I see plenty of treasure, food and supplies, that you all have generously donated, but...Are you able to give of your time and talent too?

We work every day from 9:00 AM – 2:00 PM and if you have spare time or can make time, call the office, or send an email so we can arrange our schedule to fit your schedule. We have a variety of tasks from food prep, kitchen clean-up, housekeeping duties, even light maintenance, and landscaping. We also have need for security as the weather warms up. GREAT THINGS TO DO FOR LENT bustedhalo.com

- 1. Make a commitment to read the Sunday scriptures *before* Sunday Mass. In the same way that reading up on football players, opposing teams, and coaching strategies will help you experience a game more fully, familiarizing yourself with the readings ahead of time will help you experience them in a deeper way on Sunday.
- 2. Try a new spiritual practice. Sign up for an hour of Eucharistic Adoration. Experience Mass at a parish that's made up of people from a different racial/ethnic group. Sign up for a silent retreat or spend at least one hour in silent meditation each weekend.
- 3. Think about what you usually spend your money on. Do you buy too many clothes? Spend too much on dinner out? Pick one type of expenditure that you will "fast" from during Lent, and then give the money you would usually spend to a local charity.
- 4. When you first sit down in front of your computer at work, or at the very end of your workday, try a 10-minute guided prayer from Sacred Space based on the spiritual exercises of St. Ignatius.
- 5. Go to (or watch) a weekday Mass one day during the week. Many parishes offer them early in the morning, at noon, or after work. Daily Masses are often more intimate and shorter than Sunday Mass.
- 6. Instead of turning on a streaming service for your next binge-watching session, read the entire Gospel of Mark in one sitting. As the shortest Gospel, it is the most concise story of Jesus' life, and the cross, a central Lenten symbol, plays an even more prominent role than in the other Gospels.
