#### Commentary on the Readings for the Eighth Sunday after Pentecost

"There was a certain rich man who had a steward reported. . .as squandering his counting of thy stewardship, . . .thou canst be steward no longer''' (Gospel)



As children we have access to our Father's "possessions" (Gospel). "By virtue" of our Baptism, "we (all) cry, . . . Father! unto our God (Epistle).

In the business of salvation the Father has appointed us as "stewards" over human goods and Divine graces, to use, not to abuse them. The Introit recalls that even though we now receive "mercy," yet one day we must stand before "Justice."

The meaning of this Gospel story is: "Act prudently," you children of God; use material treasures so as to make eternal friends; exercise your talents in the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. Lastly, St. John is represented by the rising eagle. The Gospel begins with the "lofty" prologue and "rises" to pierce most deeply the mysteries of God, the relationship between the Father and the Son, and the incarnation: "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was in God's presence, and the Word was God. He was present to God in the beginning. Through Him all things came into being, and apart from Him nothing came to be" (Jn 1:1-3). And "The



Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us, and we have seen His glory: The glory of an only Son coming from the Father filled with enduring love" (Jn 1:14). The Gospel of St. John, unlike the other Gospels, engages the reader with the most profound teachings of our Lord, such as the long discourses Jesus has with Nicodemus and the Samaritan woman, and the beautiful teachings on the Bread of Life and the Good Shepherd. Jesus, too, identified Himself as "the way, the truth, and the life," and anyone who embraces Him as such will rise to everlasting life with Him. <a href="https://catholicexchange.com">https://catholicexchange.com</a>

Do I have enough faith to believe: "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want" (Ps 23:1)?

A Well-Formed Conscience: The Church equips its members to address political and social questions by helping them to develop a well-formed conscience. Catholics have a serious and lifelong obligation to form their consciences in accord with human reason and the teaching of the Church. Conscience is not something that allows us to justify doing what-ever we want, nor is it a mere "feeling" about what we should or should not do. Rather, conscience is the voice of God resounding in the human heart, revealing the truth to us, and calling us to do what is good while shunning what is evil. Conscience always requires serious attempts to make sound moral judgments based on the truths of our faith. As stated in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Conscience is a judgement of rea-son whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act that he is going to perform, is in the process of performing, or has already completed. In all he says and does, man is obliged to follow faithfully what he knows to be just and right".

# **Everyday Stewardship -**


#### WHAT WE CARRY FROM TOWN TO TOWN

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't. People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.

How can I stay focused during my Holy Hour? Do you finally get to adoration, only to fidget the entire time and think too much about earthly troubles instead of focusing on our

Lord: Find out here how to have a good holy hour?

We know that spending an hour with Jesus in perpetual adoration is certainly good for our souls and minds.

Do you ever wonder how you can make the most out of that small time with Jesus?

There is no single, specific approach to make a good holy hour. Some people prefer to say a rosary or read Scripture, some like to write in a journal, and some just enjoy sitting in the peace that comes in adoration.

However, in an age where we are constantly glued to our phones and instant communication is constant, it's easy to spend our entire holy hour thinking about everything we have to do at school or work, all the texts we need to respond to, and more.

If you struggle to make a good holy hour devoted to God, Mike Aquilina and Regis J. Flaherty provide some tips in their book *The How-To Book of Catholic Devotions*.

Aquilina and Flaherty suggest that you divide your hour into four fifteen-minute segments. Your first fifteen minutes can be spent in **meditation**. Meditate on Jesus and His presence before you.

The next fifteen minutes can be spent in **thanksgiving**. Thank God for all that He has bestowed upon you, especially through the sacraments.

In the third segment, you can recite prayers of **petition**. Pray that God's will be done for all as you make your requests known to Him. Pray for the needs of yourself, your friends and family, and the Church. You can also pray for the sick, the poor, and the lonely.

Finally, you can use your last fifteen minutes in **adoration**. Reflect on the areas in your spiritual life where you can improve and express sorrow for your sins.

Most of all, as Mike Aquilina and Regis J. Flaherty emphasize, the most important part of a holy hour is to listen throughout your time with Jesus and to allow Him to speak to your heart.


