Commentary on the Readings for the Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

"He began to cast out those who were selling and buying

in (the temple). 'My house is a house of prayer,' but you have made it a den of thieves" (Gospel).



The tears of Jesus! The

lashes of His righteous anger! Why does Jesus still weep? Why must He still "cast out?" Because amongst us there are those who desecrate what is consecrate—their baptized, Christened souls! even as Jerusalem, chosen by God, rejects His Christ (Gospel).

Consider what happened to "idolaters," rejecting God; to materialists who lived merely "to eat and drink, andplay." War, disease, famine, depression were the penalty. "There fell in one day twenty-three thousand". Yet do not go through life with a fear complex. "God. . .will not permit you to be tempted beyond your strength" (Epistle). Focusing the Gospel

Key words and phrases: large crowd was coming to him,

Where can we buy enough food, test him, he himself knew what he was going to do, had their fill.



To the point: What answer did Philip need to give Jesus to pass the test?

When Jesus asks about where to buy food to satisfy the hunger of the large crowd, he is not thinking about a store and purchases. He is really asking a question about who he is. Jesus knows full well that the "where" of the food will be himself. The superabundance of food Jesus provides from so little is a sign of the fullness of Life—his very self—Jesus gives. So, Philip's answer? "Give them yourself." <u>https://liturgy.slu.edu</u>

Beginning on the 17th Sunday of Ordinary Time of Year B for the next five weeks (except for the Solemnity of the Assumption) we are going to hear the Eucharistic chapter of John 6 before we enter back into the Gospel of Mark on the 22nd Sunday. These weeks help us appreciate the solicitous concern the Lord has for both the physical and spiritual well-being of those who love him and are united in the Body of Christ.





Everyday Stewardship -

St. Therese of Lisieux made a point of going the extra mile in kindness towards those people who really got under her skin. It was part of her own brand of Everyday Stewardship — thanking God for all His creation, even the parts with which, in her own humanness, she struggled to cope.

I think about this a lot when I challenge myself to give thanks for things that bother me and people who challenge me. When I do this, I envision Christ giving thanks over those insufficient loaves. How many of us would see that paltry little basket and kick a rock in frustration because we can't feed all our people? "You didn't give me enough, Lord! You didn't give me enough patience, enough money, enough creativity, enough stamina to be a good steward. If you had given me more, I could also give more!"

In those moments of despair, we need to take a good look at the life God has given us. We need to look at the trials and the challenges and the shortcomings. The hopes that didn't pan out, the disappointments that keep cropping up. Somewhere therein lies what we need to be the steward God asks us to be, just as St. Therese's own stewardship was defined by the people she simply couldn't stand.

God does not give us all we want. He does not give us all we ask for. He does us one better: He gives us all we need. It's all in the basket.

What are the seven spiritual works

of mercy? How can we answer the spiritual needs of friends, family, and even the world?

Bite-Sized Faith Throughout history, the Catholic Church has emphasized the importance of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

In order to spread the Gospel here on earth, we must practice both.

While the corporal works of mercy identify how we can serve others' physical needs, the spiritual works of mercy call us to help each other (and ourselves) spiritually. According to the *Baltimore Catechism*, the seven-spiritual works of mercy are:

- 1. Admonish the sinner
- 2. Instruct the ignorant
- 3. Counsel the doubtful
- 4. Comfort the sorrowful
- 5. Bear wrongs patiently
- 6. Forgive all injuries
- 7. Pray for the living and the dead

As Catholics, we are called to be our brother's keeper. We are obligated to help one another get to heaven by living out the spiritual works of mercy in ways that are rooted in love and mercy.

If you have a friend who is doubting their faith or doesn't know a lot about Catholicism, the first step is to pray for them. You could also invite them to a Bible study or share a book that may have helped you in your spiritual life.

You can comfort the sorrowful by simply being present to those who are suffering, bringing someone a homemade meal, sending them a card, or listening to their struggles.

Forgiving others and bearing wrongs patiently are essential to our salvation. In the Our Father, we ask God to forgive us our sins against Him just as we forgive others' sins against us. To keep our hearts open to His grace, we must let go of grudges against one another and avoid bitterness.
