Commentary on the Readings for the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost

"They brought to Him one deaf and dumb. . . And his ears

were at once opened, and... his tongue was loosed, and he began to speak correctly" (Gospel).

May your ears tune in on God (symbolized by

kneeling figures at left). May your tongue broadcast His Gospel (indicated by figure of "speaker" to the right), in the "holy place" of your parish activities, in the "house" of your family, among the "people" of your acquaintance (Introit). If we are "to hear" His Voice, we must go "aside from the crowd" at our Sunday Mass, for at least one uninterrupted hour. Only then, like the cured deafmute, shall we return and gladly "publish" the truth (Gospel).

St. Paul relates how he received "the gospel"; how he then passed it on to others. "Hold it fast as I preached it to you" (Epistle). https://liturgy.slu.edu

Connecting the Gospel ...

... to the First Reading: The miraculous provision of bread in the wilderness sustains Elijah's physical life for the journey to Horeb, the mountain of God. Jesus offers to his disciples the food of his teaching as well as his own flesh for the journey to eternal life.

... to experience: When we love another, we open ourselves to the mystery of who that person is. In this

<u>Gospel</u>, Jesus invites us to love him, to encounter the mystery of who he is: the "living bread" who brings us to "live forever." https://liturgy.slu.edu

What's Your Hearth Cake? "Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you." I've been to a lot of meetings in my years of work in the Church, and you can take my word for it: the ones with snacks just seem to go better.



I don't know what it is exactly. Maybe it's just that people are in a more agreeable mood if you show up with donuts. Or maybe it's about the very real sense of community and camaraderie that is created at a table where people are engaging in that most human of tasks — eating — beside one another. I think a big part of it comes down to the simple fact that we're all just nicer people when we're fed.

This rings true spiritually, too. We simply must remain fed if we, in turn, are to feed others. Think of a time when you have neglected your relationship with God — when you haven't fed yourself with whatever it is that you need to remain committed to the journey of a Christian life. Is it Mass attendance? Is it prayer or Scripture reading? Is it time with your small group, or conversation with a trusted friend who knows your soul? What sustains your ability to be a good disciple, a good steward? What inspires you to give more freely, to love more abundantly?

Whatever it is, that's your hearth cake. That's your jug of water. Don't neglect it. The Angel of the Lord is nudging you in your sleep: "Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you."

Why is St. John Vianney the patron saint of parish priests? Amidst the vicious anti-Catholic persecutions of the French Revolution, a young man attended Mass in secret...John Vianney

was born three years before the French Revolution would tear Catholic France apart and send her clergy into hiding. His family traveled long distances to hear clandestine Masses and he received his sacramental formation unbeknownst to the secular authorities.

By 1802, with Napoleon's rise to power, Catholics were once again allowed to practice their faith. The young Vianney, deeply desiring to be a priest, was able to recommence his education. But he struggled mightily with the academics, and more challenges came when he was drafted into Napoleon's army. Providence ensured he never made it to his unit. By twists and turns he instead ended up with a group of deserters hiding in the mountains, and lived there for over a year, regularly hiding from the gendarmes who came searching for deserters.

He was finally able to continue his studies in 1810 and was ordained in 1815. In 1818, he was assigned as the parish priest to the small town of Ars, where he would show himself to be a priest after the Heart of Christ.

Ars was not a pious town. Indifference for the Faith was the sour fruit of the Revolution's persecutions, and Abbé Vianney found that many of the people spent Sundays working, dancing, and drinking in the taverns rather than honoring God.

Just as he had with all his other difficulties, Vianney was undeterred. He preached homilies to rekindle the practice of the Faith and became known for the spiritual direction he gave to souls, who began to travel long distances to hear his advice. People of all ages, stations, and spiritual levels—some of them even coming from other countries—came to see him. The numbers eventually reached tens of thousands per year. He spent hours and hours in the confessional—as many as 16 to 18 per day towards the end of his life—and was gifted with supernatural knowledge of souls and events he could not have known about without God's aid. He imposed intense penances upon himself constantly, never eating or sleeping enough for an average person, and was subjected to frequent attacks from the devil.

After a life fully dedicated to his mission as a priest, the holy Curé (that is, "parish priest") of Ars died in 1859 at the age of 73 and was declared *venerable* just 15 years later. Pope St. Pius X beatified him in 1905 and put him forward as a model for the parochial clergy. He was canonized in 1925 by Pope Pius XI, who in 1929 declared him the patron saint of parish priests.

St. John Vianney's mission was simple and not particularly glorious, but his immense virtue and total dedication to his calling elevated him to the ranks of the heroic. We, too, might be called to a simple life, but we, too, are called to heroic virtue in that simplicity. Growth in virtue *is* possible with God's grace. www.catholiccompany.com



Start Praying the Liturgy of the Hours Today

Over the next few Sundays we will cover an article on the Liturgy of the Hours by Fr. Ed Broom, OMV. This liturgical prayer of the Church is prayed daily and unites the totality of the Catholic Church throughout the whole world. Catholic means universal and indeed it is a *Catholic prayer*. This is not meant just for priests, but is prayed by deacons, religious and the Laity.

It does not come easy at first and requires effort to learn the art of prayer. Following we will cover the essential aspects (17 steps) to motivate us to undertake these practices. Let it become a daily practice that is not abandoned!

- **4. Example of the Apostles**. By praying the Psalms, we are following in the footsteps of the Apostles. The Acts of the Apostles portrays the Apostles going to the Temple at set Hours for prayer. So, it is with the Liturgy of the Hours: we go to God in prayer at set times during the day.
- **5. Sanctify the Hours**. Another key element of the Liturgy of the Hours is the command of Our Lord to pray always and to never give up heart. (Lk. 18:1) By praying the Liturgy of the Hours we are summoned to pray at different hours of the day—actually from Morning to Night.
- 6. Different Hours of Prayer In the Liturgy of the Hours. In the full context of the Liturgy of the Hours, there are actually five different times designated for prayer; as such, these five different times are called to be sanctified. When are these specific times? Morning Prayer (upon rising until 10 a.m.); Midday Prayer (10 a.m. to 4 p.m.); Evening Prayer (4 p.m. to 8 p.m.); Night prayer, before retiring for the night. The last prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours is The Office of Readings. This prayer can be done any time during the course of the day.
- 7. The Two Prime Time Hours of Prayer: Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer. The two principal hours of prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours would be Morning Prayer (also called Lauds); then Evening Prayer (also call Vespers). These are considered the prime or principal hours of prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours. By praying them at the designated time brackets, the Morning hours are sanctified as well as the Evening hours. In a word, by constant and assiduous praying of the Liturgy of the Hours, our lives are being sanctified, thus our holiness blossoms and flourishes. ~ continued next week.


