

Connecting the Gospel

... to the First Reading: Moses understood that God

... to experience: Spouses spend all their married lives coming to know one another and building a shared identity. Coming to know, understand, and accept the identity of Jesus also takes a lifetime of learning and commitment. But it grants an eternity of fullness of life. We tend to live in closed circles of people because of comfortableness, likemindedness, and shared values and beliefs. We approach the end of the Church's year. We, too, have grown to maturity. In our youth we regarded perfection an easy accomplishment. Now we plead for Redemption. We implore Hi Mercy to *direct our hearts* (Prayer) in the *evening* of our life (Offertory).

Our plea today is: *Give peace, O Lord.* What is the condition for peace with neighbor, peace amongst nations? It is a call to set ourselves right with God!

Are we ambassadors of peace to others? The *paralytic* was unable to do anything for himself. Did not Jesus cure him, absolve him, only when his friends *brought* him and He saw *their faith?* Excerpted from *My Sunday Missal*, Confraternity of the Precious Blood.



26th Sunday Justice Challenge: St. Vincent de Paul's Feast Day is September 27. This saint once wrote, "I am for God and the poor." In mid-life. Vincent

underwent a transformation which caused him to dedicate the rest of his life to those in need. He taught his followers that we encounter Christ in the needs of our poor neighbors, stating that "The poor are your masters, and you are their servants." Your challenge this week is to interview someone in poverty and let them tell you what they most need. You might consider serving at a soup kitchen or shelter to find your "master," the person to whom you are going to listen. Then really do listen—with your heart as well as your head—to this person's wisdom and experience. Try your best to do what he/she recommends to help the poor get out of their situation.

"Life is so busy. How can I find time to pray?" With all the obligations in our lives, it's tempting to leave prayer till tomorrow. And then forget about it.

How can we make time for prayer?

If anyone in the world might have seemed to

have an excuse for "not having time to pray," it was Mother Teresa and her tireless sisters in the Missionaries of Charity.



But Mother Teresa never allowed any amount of work to encroach on her prayer time or that of her sisters. The good Mother knew that, without prayer, everything else failed.

Prayer is the heart of every Christian life—not just that of religious orders. If you take the heart out, the body will die. If you make the heart stronger, the body will be stronger. If you make greater demands on the body, the heart needs to be extra-strong.

It's easy to sideline prayer amidst the constant demands of work, family, school, and other practical things, but if we aren't praying, every aspect of our lives suffers.

One way to make prayer a consistent practice is to schedule regular prayer time for yourself at home. A holy hour at home—perhaps weekly, perhaps biweekly—can keep you centered and spiritually strong, even if the pace of life seems overwhelming at times. It'll help you to keep praying even if you can't make a holy hour in church as often as you'd like to.
