



Connecting the Gospel





... to experience: All of us have experienced the sheer goodness of another person, the utter joy of an event, the complete surprise of intimacy. With reflection we conclude that we have indeed experienced the nearness of Christ in the flesh among us.

Commentary on the Readings of the 1962 Roman Missal:

Third Sunday of Advent





has stood One Whom you do not know" (Gospel).

This is known as "Rejoice" Sunday, from the opening word of the Introit. Despite our self-praised progress, real joy is missing from modern life. In such a "desert" we must look to Christ. Only He can "bring light to the darkness of our minds" (Prayer). Only He can bless, deliver, and forgive (Offertory). Only He can "say to the faint-hearted, "Take courage" (Communion Verse).

During these days before Christmas "have no anxiety" about selecting or receiving mere tinsel gifts but prepare "in... prayer...with thanksgiving" and "guard...your minds in Christ," the true source of our joy (Epistle).

What is the "Christmas Nail"?

It's a little ornament that carries a profound meaning

Maybe this Christmas, a friend will visit your house. As they admire your Christmas tree decorated with lights,

images of the Nativity, perhaps some colorful ribbon and a snowman or two, they'll spy a strange little ornament hanging close to the trunk of the tree. It's almost invisible—hidden behind branches and lights and other decorations.

It's a plain, long nail—much like the nails that pierced the hands and feet of Christ during His Passion. Your guests might wonder why such a nail would be found on a Christmas tree.

You'll explain to them that Jesus was born in Bethlehem so that, thirty-three years later, He could die for our sins on Calvary. The Nail is a reminder of the Passion this little babe would undergo, as innocent at His death as He was at His birth. It reminds us of His sufferings and the incredible love that motivated both His earthly nativity and His death. This Nail decorates a Christmas tree, and the nails of His Passion decorated the Tree of the Cross.

The Nail is not in a place of prominence, but almost hidden away near the trunk. It is not so much a *decoration*, but a prayerful reminder for the family and for those guests with particularly keen eyes and hearts.

A poem explains the meaning of The Christmas Nail: This is The Christmas Nail.

It is to be hung on a sturdy branch,

a branch near the trunk,

a branch that will hold such a spike without being noticed by well-wishers

dropping by to admire one's tinseled tree.

The nail is known only to the home that hangs it

Understood only by the heart that knows its significance.

It is hung with the thought that the Christmas tree but foreshadows the Christ-tree which only He could decorate for us, ornamented with nails as this.





THE WELL NEVER DRIES UP

Depending on how your mood is today, the words of Paul will hit you differently. "Rejoice always," he tells us. Well, if your football team is poised to win this weekend or next, maybe you're really feeling this vibe. But if you've got a long slog at work ahead of you this week and a to-do list that only seems to grow and never shrink, it may make you grumble. "Rejoice always? Always? When I'm tired? Cranky? When I'm sick of doing and giving? Thanks, Paul. I'll be sure to scribble that phrase on a Post-It and stick it to my dashboard for when some entitled punk inevitably cuts me off on tomorrow's morning commute." When we feel this way, we know it's time to head back to the well. Think of all the places in Scripture where God compares His love, His mercy, His salvation to water. And not just any water - living water, water that moves. God's strength is not a stagnant puddle sure to evaporate and disappear. It's water you can keep coming back to. It's water that never dries up. Which is good news for us, because we never stop failing to do what we should, never stop failing to feel the joy and the compassion and the selflessness we are called to. We need a source of living water if we are going to 'rejoice always.' To be everyday stewards, we need a well that never empties. The fountain of salvation never dries up. There is always more there for us to draw from. It's a sign of His commitment — so let us, in turn, be committed to Him. ~ Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS
