



Each year the Church observes January 22 as a Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children.

Pope Saint John Paul, II in Evangleium Vitae stated,

"A great prayer for life is urgently needed, a prayer which will rise up throughout the world. Through special initiatives and in daily prayer, may an impassioned plea rise to God, the Creator and lover of life, from every Christian community, from every group and association, from every family and from the heart of every believer."

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' website states: The over 60 million abortions since the 1973 decisions of Roe *v. Wade* and Doe *v. Bolton* reflect with heartbreaking magnitude what Pope Francis means by a "throwaway culture." However, we have great trust in God's providence. We are reminded time and again in Scripture to seek the Lord's help, and as people of faith, we believe that our prayers are heard.

As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or giving alms.

What are the seven-spiritual works of mercy? How can we answer the spiritual needs of friends, family, and even the world? Throughout history, the Catholic Church has emphasized

the importance of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. In order to spread the Gospel here on earth, we must practice both.

While the corporal works of mercy identify how we can serve others' physical needs, the spiritual works of mercy call us to help each other (and ourselves) spiritually.

According to the *Baltimore Catechism*, the seven-spiritual works of mercy are:

- 1. Admonish the sinner
- 2. *Instruct the ignorant*
- 3. Counsel the doubtful
- 4. Comfort the sorrowful
- 5. Bear wrongs patiently
- 6. Forgive all injuries
- 7. Pray for the living and the dead

As Catholics, we are called to be our brother's keeper. We are obligated to help one another get to heaven by living out the spiritual works of mercy in ways that are rooted in love and mercy.

If you have a friend who is doubting their faith or doesn't know a lot about Catholicism, the first step is to pray for them. You could also invite them to a Bible study or share a book that may have helped you in your spiritual life.

You can comfort the sorrowful by simply being present to those who are suffering, bringing someone a homemade meal, sending them a card, or listening to their struggles.

Forgiving others and bearing wrongs patiently are essential to our salvation. In the Our Father, we ask God to forgive us our sins against Him just as we forgive others' sins against us. To keep our hearts open to His grace, we must let go of grudges against one another and avoid bitterness.

... to the First Reading: Isaiah provides us with language to describe believing: "I will not be silent ... I will not be quiet." He gives us as well language to describe the intimacy of belief: "My delight," "Espoused," "the Lord delights in you," "your Builder shall marry you," "God rejoice in you."

... to experience: Some changes are self-initiated, for example, we stop smoking, resolve to exercise daily, watch less TV. EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "Spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding of Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers – do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may see to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only the, let us do whatever He tells us.

We pray for all those suffering from religious discrimination and persecution; may their own rights and dignity be recognized, which originate from being




recognized, which originate from being brothers and sisters in the human family.
