



Focusing the Gospel

Key words and phrases: new commandment, Son of Man glorified, God is glorified, As I have loved you ... love one another

To the point: Jesus' new commandment is "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." The nature of our love as disciples is specific, singular, incomparable: we are to love to the extent and in the manner Jesus loved. Our love is to be the self-

sacrificing love of Jesus. It is this kind of love which brings Jesus glory. It is this kind of love which brings God glory. It is this kind of love which enables us to share in that same glory.



Justice Challenge: We can do no lasting good for the world on our own. We need the support of a loving community. Only comm-unities, not individuals, produce great works. We build up the kingdom of justice

by being a kingdom of love. Jesus commanded us to love one another for good reason. It is from love that justice blossoms. The challenge this week is to do something that builds unity in your family and in your parish. Without love uniting you to others, you are a silent symphony to the world.

How can we defend the papacy using Scripture?

Bible provides us with some powerful, easy-to-use tools.

"The word 'pope' isn't in the Bible."
Oh no. Your Protestant friend wants to talk about
the papacy. You're nervous already.
They start quoting Scripture...your brain freezes
up...

Relax! You have many tools at your disposal for this discussion. Lots of them come right out of the Bible.

We'll look at two of these key Scripture passages today. (There are more that we can't fit in here.)

Matthew 16:13-19 is the papacy passage *par excellence*, one which will undoubtedly come up in any discussion with Protestants on the subject. Here we find Peter's confession of faith and Jesus' installation of him as head of the Church:

"And I say to thee: That thou art Peter; and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give to thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven. And whatsoever thou shalt bind upon earth, it shall be bound also in heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt loose upon earth, it shall be loosed also in heaven."—Mt. 16:18-19

Jesus renames Simon by giving him the new name "Peter" (Greek *petros*, "rock"), signifying his new role.

Sometimes our Protestant friends will argue that Jesus is referring not to Peter himself but to his confession of faith when He says "on this rock." They will note that, in Greek, Simon's new name—petros—and the word Jesus uses for "rock"—petra—are different and therefore cannot be referring to the same thing.

However, this is simply a grammatical adjustment made when translating into Greek, which has both masculine and feminine nouns. *Petra* happens to feminine, so it's adjusted to *petros* when applied to a man.

In the language Jesus was actually speaking—Aramaic—there is no gender distinction among nouns. The word in Aramaic—and the new name Jesus invented for Simon—are both *kepha*.

An Old Testament verse that backs up Matthew 16 is Isaiah 22, which Jesus is directly mirroring when He speaks of keys and binding/loosing. Here the Lord speaks to the king's prime minister, whose role was to rule *in place of the king* during his absence. The Lord foretells a future leader who will hold this authority:

"And I will lay the key of the house of David upon his shoulder: and he shall open, and none shall shut: and he shall shut, and none shall open." —Isaiah 22:22

So in Matthew 16, Jesus is giving Peter the authority to rule in His place as His prime minister—as the *Vicar of Christ*, you might say.

Loving as New Creation

"There's something different about you."

Think about the times in your life when this has been said to you. Maybe it was after someone complimented you on a job well done, and you realized that you were walking through life with a little more confidence. Maybe it was after meeting someone special, as you carried the glow of that relationship wherever you went. Chances are, if someone has noticed something different about you, it's because, inwardly, you've been changed by the loving or respectful actions of another person.

Love, you see, can make us into new creations. From the love of God flows the grace to tackle any challenge, including the biggest challenge of all: loving each other well. Christ knows what a big request this is. He was human, too. He came and lived among us. He knew intimately what it was to love people in the chaos of their own flaws. He knew what he was asking of us when he said, "As I have loved you, so you should also love one another."

In essence, this is the call to stewardship: loving as Christ loves, amidst the messiness of everyday reality. Loving with accountability, challenging ourselves and our brothers and sisters to be faithful even when it is hard. Loving with an unflinching sense of hospitality that welcomes even those we do not agree with or understand. Loving with gratitude, giving thanks for the great variety of ways that Christ can make himself known to us through others.

It isn't easy — we all know that. But if we ask God for the grace to remain steadfast in this greatest commandment, we will be given what we need to live as new creations. ~ *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS*
