

### Focusing the Gospel

Key words and phrases: Whoever loves me, Father will love, make our dwelling, Holy Spirit. ... will teach you everything, peace I give you, may believe

...the point: Jesus promises to send us the Holy Spirit who will "teach [us] everything." The Holy Spirit does not teach us what to believe, but to believe.

To believe means to live out of the divine indwelling, live out of the peace given, live out of the mutual exchange of love between God and us. Believing is living what the Spirit teaches us.



**Justice Challenge:** In this week's Gospel, Jesus promises to send his Spirit to dwell in his followers, so they don't feel abandoned. He also gifts them with peace. Your challenge this

week is to be a peacemaker. Who in your family needs to make peace with someone? Who are the people at work or school who are in conflict with each other? Who in the world is at war? Do two things this week. Take action to bring people together in your personal life. And pray for peace in a place around the globe where conflict is a way of life. In both cases, let the Spirit promised by Jesus guide you to be a person of peace.

The Exact Year, Month, Day and Hour When **Jesus Died.** We know that the high priest Caiaphas instigated Jesus' crucifixion. Caiaphas served from A.D. 18 to 36. Jesus was crucified during Pontius Pilate's reign, between A.D. 26 to 36. We know He died in the 15th year of Tiberius Caesar's rule, which reduces the range to between A.D. 29 and 36. He was crucified on a Friday before the Passover meal. There were only two Friday evenings on which Passover began between A.D. 29 and 36 – April 7, A.D. 30 and April 3, A.D. 33. Since Jesus' ministry spanned three Passovers, A.D. 30 is out. That leaves Friday, April 3, A.D. 33. This Madonna will also help you remember that every task, offered in a spirit of love and prayer, is a step along the path to holiness. ### **Management According to the Apostles**

If you've ever worked in any kind of organization, for-profit or not-for-profit, I'm sure you have attended a conference or two. Whatever our expectations going in, I usually find these conferences expose me to communication and problem-solving styles that are different from my own, nudging me into a little unexpected self-discovery. And it's a great opportunity to meet new people and do something different.

Here's my idea for a leadership conference: The Management Style of the Apostles. Think about it, the only thing the Apostles had more abundantly than holiness was problems. Lots and lots of problems ... most of them of the human resources variety. It's no small feat, starting Christ's Church on earth. I wouldn't want to be project manager of that endeavor.

The Acts of the Apostles is, in some ways, a big book full of problems and ways to solve them. It's a blueprint for tackling interpersonal issues in the manner of a true steward, who encounters every problem starting from the same place: What would my Master want?

It's a question we should be asking ourselves every time we, too, encounter a problem especially problems relating to other people. What is the truth in this situation, and how would God have me communicate it? How could I handle this in a way that is worthy of the name of my Master?

In Acts, we see a lot of characteristics of everyday stewardship. We see the Apostles mind-fully acknowledge the lack of peace that is posed by problems like false teachings, this Gospel's problem du jour. They prayerfully confront the obstacles to salvation posed by these issues. Always, always, always, their main objective is to reveal the will of God, remaining committed to the truth while help-ing newcomers find avenues to salvation.
