Justice Challenge: This Sunday's Gospel tells of Jesus sending out the 72 disciples. The message they were to give people was one of peace: "Peace to this household!" Jesus embodied

peace, and he challenged his disciples to be bearers of his peace. Yet in our world today, there are so many examples of violence, tension, war, and conflict. Your challenge this week is to look at your own lives—as individuals and as families. How are you sowing peace at home, in your parish or school, in your neighborhood and community? What is one action you can take this week—be it prayer, a kind gesture, asking forgiveness, seeking reconciliation, or building bridges between people—to bring peace into the hearts of individuals or a group in conflict?

Connecting the Gospel ...

... **to the First Reading**: Isaiah's vision uses different images to describe the same reality presented in the Gospel. The fruit of the disciples' labors (peace, healing, and God's kingdom at hand) are described in

Isaiah as comfort, abundance, and prosperity. Both readings envision God's power and presence now and a future when our "heart[s] shall rejoice."



... **to experience**: Many people live in fear of a future marked by destruction and chaos; they have abandoned hope. These readings invite us to hope in the

future God has in store for us, one of blessing and joy. At the same time, because God's kingdom is already at hand, we live in this blessing and joy now.





Why is St. Anthony the patron saint of lost items?

A lost psalter, a novice, a powerful prayer...an everlasting patronage.

We often turn to St. Anthony of Padua when we've lost something—but *why?* Where did this well-known patronage originate?

It goes back to a time when St. Anthony himself lost something very precious.

A Franciscan who lived in the 13th century, St. Anthony was a particularly gifted teacher and preacher. He owned a psalter (a book of the Psalms) that was very dear to him. Before the invention of the printing press, books in general were precious since they had to be copied out by hand.

Additionally, St. Anthony had made many notes for his sermons and classes in the pages of his copy. It was invaluable to his work, and when it disappeared one day, he was grieved by its loss. He prayed fervently that it would be found.

Turns out, an unhappy novice had decided to leave the religious life and, when he had departed the monastery, had taken St. Anthony's psalter with him! After the saint's prayers, the novice not only



returned the psalter, but also returned to the religious life. The actual psalter is said to be housed at a Franciscan friary in Bologna, Italy.

Everyday Stewardship When God Speaks Like a Polish Grandmother

When God Speaks Like a Polish Grandmother - A friend of mine had a Polish grandmother who was famous for giving her children some blunt advice every time they left the house: "Eyes straight ahead. Mind your own business."

Every mother knows her children best, and this mother knew hers liked to argue and sometimes liked to show off. She knew that could lead to trouble. She could not anticipate every scenario they would encounter each time they departed from her. All she could do was distill what she knew about life, safety, and manners into a few simple words, and hand them over to her children like a set of car keys or a hastily scribbled map. In this way, a woman who rarely said "I love you" expressed her devotion. And long after she was dead and buried, her aging sons and daughters repeated these words to themselves, like a child wrapping himself in a warm blanket.

Jesus does much the same for us, in many portions of the Gospels. "Ask the master to send out laborers for his harvest . . . Carry no money . . . Eat what is set before you . . . Know that the Kingdom of God is at hand . . . Rejoice because your names are written in Heaven."

He knows us best — knows our strengths, but even more importantly, He knows our weaknesses. He doesn't always have the space to address each of these explicitly in the pages of Scripture, but what He can do is distill the truth of effective evangelization into a few simple words, and hand them over to us as food for our journey of discipleship. In this way, a God who addresses the entire world and every soul who ever lived also speaks intimately to each one of us.
