Justice Challenge: Sunday's Gospel has Jesus answering the question of who he is by stating: "Go back and report to John what you hear and see: the blind recover their sight, cripples walk,

lepers are cured, the deaf hear, dead men are raised to life, and the poor have the good news preached to them" (Mt. 11:2-11). Jesus equates his very identity with care for the poor and marginalized. Your challenge this week is to identify the blind, the lepers, and the poor in your life. Discuss one particular person in need whom God is calling you and your family to serve. Select an action you can do for this person, just as Jesus did. And remember that Pope Francis said that having a friend who is poor is a pathway to heaven. So . . . just do it!

#### **STEWARDSHIP MOMENT**

"Therefore, every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. "Matthew 3:10

Do you bear good fruit for Jesus? Do you spend time in prayer, or do you waste it with mindless activity? Do you use your talent to help others or are you too busy? Do you use your treasure to support the Church, or do you buy more things that go unused. Our time, talent and treasure are gifts from God. What we do with these gifts is our gift back to Him. What gifts are you planning to give to the Lord during this upcoming Christmas season?

## Connecting the Gospel ...

... to the First Reading: Isaiah announces that salvation is revealed in such wonders as making the blind see, the deaf hear, and the lame walk. These are exactly the works Jesus does, revealing to John and to us that Jesus is "the Christ," the



Savior.

... to experience: We learn who a person is by observing how that person lives and behaves. We learn who Jesus is by observing how faithful believers live and behave.



"Gaudete" is taken from the Entrance Antiphon: "rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed. the Lord is near" (paraphrase, Phil 4:4-5). This

Sunday we light a pink candle to indicate a joyful feast day or holiday looking with joyful expectation in the eager preparation for the Solemnity of Christmas.

JOY in looking forward to celebrating Christmas. JOY in recalling the birth of Jesus on the first Christmas. JOY because he was born to save us from sins. JOY in the anticipation of the Second Coming.



#### What is the tradition of the Christmas "Oplatki" wafer?

The spirit of Christ-like charity is baked into this wafer-bread.

The Oplatki have an unassuming appearance and only the mildest flavor, looking more like a thick piece of paper.

This modest appearance, however, conceals a symbolically rich custom.

The Christmas wafers come from Eastern Europe. The name means "Angel Bread." Made only of flour and water, they are stamped with Christmas images such as the Star of Bethlehem or the Nativity.



On Christmas Eve, the head of the family prays for the members of his family, present or absent, then breaks a piece off the wafer and gives it to each person. As the family members receive the wafer pieces, they are greeted with a kiss and a felicitation for a joyful feast. They then return the

greeting in the same way.

The lesson of this custom is that the family must be united with the bonds of charity. It reminds us that we do not seek salvation alone, but with others, especially our family. We should help each other obtain salvation, always bearing Christ-like charity toward one another. When we are united in charity, we are joined, by the head of the family, to the unbroken links of One Body, One Bread, One Christ, and One Church.

The Giving Tree is a variation of the Jesse Tree that became popular in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century.

# Everyday Stewardship How Much Is Enough?



I've got some great news for some of you: Jesus Christ doesn't care what name you bear. He doesn't care where you were born, and he doesn't care what your family tree looks like. He doesn't care where you grew up or where you went to school.

I've also got some bad news for some of you: See above.

It's so easy to take our salvation for granted. The mercy of God makes it so. Look at John the Baptist — he was pouring water on everybody who wanted it. Everybody but one group: those who expected it. Those who thought it was a given because of who they were, because of what they were. Those who had no intention of doing the work of repentance.

Sometimes, because God is so faithful, we make the mistake of forgetting that He is also just.

I am baptized, we think. I made my First Communion, and I was Confirmed. That's enough.

I went to Catholic school. I know all the Ten Commandments and I can tell you anything you want to know about the Popes. That's enough.

I'm on parish council. I put money in the basket, and I volunteer. That's enough.

None of it is enough. It would never be enough. And before we look upon the Pharisees and Sadducees with too much judgment, we need to remember: the work of repentance is ongoing. It is a process that we must commit to within ourselves, continuously.

God is the missing element to this equation. He is the one who raises children to Abraham from the stones. If we rely only on our own abilities, our own merits, our own offerings, it will never be enough. – *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS*
