In Latin, gratia has the primary meaning of favor, goodwill, kindness, and friendship.

weekend of the Catholic Engaged Encounter 17-19 February)



Connecting the Gospel ...

... to the Second Reading: Mary reflects "in her heart" on the mystery unfolding within and around her.

This mystery is fully revealed when God pours "the Spirit of his Son into our hearts," making us children of God.

... to experience: Once we are beyond the Christmas season, we tend to forget about the import of the



incarnation for our daily living. Mary teaches us that continued active reflection on this mystery is how we are drawn more deeply into its fullness and able more perfectly to live the grace of being children and heirs of God.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

"And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." LUKE 2:19

After Jesus, we look to Mary as an ideal steward. Her entire life was lived in obedience to God's call. She heard God's message, and immediately said "yes." Mary teaches us to live with joy and gratitude for the many blessings God has given us. Just as the moon reflects the light of the sun, Mary reflects the light of Christ. Like Mary, we are called to reflect Christ's light to the world. We do this through lives of gratitude and generosity.

The first five of the ten principal virtues of Our Lady, as they are listed by St. Louis de Montfort in his beloved work *True Devotion to Mary:* profound humility, lively faith, blind obedience, continual prayer, and universal mortification – can be found in the bulletin insert.

Today, we will finish with the latter five: divine purity, ardent charity, heroic patience, angelic sweetness, and divine wisdom.

Divine purity. To be pure of heart means that everything in your heart is of God and in accordance with His will. "Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God..." Mary saw God more clearly than any other human because nothing blurred her vision of Him.



Ardent charity. Mary's heart was the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit. She was continually on fire with the love of God, and everything she did, said, and thought was motivated by this boundless love for God and for her neighbor for His sake.

Heroic patience. Our Lady encountered difficulties in her life as everyone on earth does. In fact, next to Jesus Himself, she suffered more than any human being who ever lived. But no matter how big or small the trial, she bore it patiently, without sourness, irritability, or despondence. Even the death of her Son was a trial she bore willingly—and *heroically*.

Angelic sweetness. We might sometimes wonder what it would have been like to meet Our Lady on the streets of Nazareth. It would have been like meeting an angel. You wouldn't have been the same afterwards. She radiated kindness, generosity, peace to everyone—even the most difficult individuals.

Divine wisdom. Mary's ongoing contemplation of divine things caused her to see everything through the lens of the divine—which is a lens of perfect clarity and accuracy. Everything to her gained its proper perspective when viewed as part of God's plan. She therefore possessed the gift of wisdom in the highest degree.

Contemplate Our Lady's virtues often and strive to apply them to your life—but don't do it alone. Our Lady herself is ready and waiting to help you imitate her virtues and guide you in the paths of God. She is our Mother, given to us by Christ Himself, and she loves us more than we can imagine. She Kept All of These Things in Her Heart



"What was my first word? Who was there when I was born? When did I start to walk? Which toys did I play with? What made me cry when I was a baby?"

My oldest has reached the age where she has started to ask questions like this. As she grows up, she is realizing that, in order to understand the world around her, she must first understand herself. This makes her insatiably curious about her own identity, her history — her "origin story," as they say in the movies.

I've got most of it documented either in writing or in photos, but even if it's a detail that wasn't scribbled in a baby book or saved to my digital cloud, it's a memory that I can quickly summon and make real for her as we snuggle and talk about who she was, who she is, and who she may become.

I'm the mom. I have kept all of these things in my heart.

The Blessed Mother knew more about God before opening a book than most of us could discover after a lifetime of study and prayer. There is no one whose knowledge of Christ was so intimate, so deep, so simultaneously ordinary, and extraordinary, as the human woman who bore him, birthed him, nursed him, raised him, and eventually gave him up.

In the way that I can tell my daughter everything there is to know about the part of her life she cannot recall, Mary can tell us everything we need to know about Christ. All we have to do is ask.

CHALKING THE DOOR

The Epiphany House Blessing

"Chalking the door" is a centuries-old custom in which Christians gather on the feast of the Epiphany to ask God's blessing on their home.

"20+C+M+B+23" – "20" and "23" refer to the actual year.

The "+" between letters symbolizes the cross of Christ. The 'C M B" initials represent the three Magi, and these initials abbreviate the Latin "*Christus Mansionem Benedict*" (May Christ bless this house).
