Latin has also given us one the chief words we use to describe to Whom we pray: the Trinity. Largely for its first two centuries, Trinity as a term describing God was unknown to the Christian world. It was first coined by the Latin Father Tertullian, writing in the early part of the third century.

Preparing for Mass

We should plan our schedule around Mass, not Mass around our schedule. +Arriving early allows us to read the Scriptures ahead of time and spend some time in prayer. +Going to Confession before Mass. For those unable to go on Saturday at SHC (3-4 PM), Fr. Ross Tozzi or Fr. Piotr Oprych can be found at SHC 30 minutes prior to Mass near the office door in the entrance (*Narthex*). +Putting our hands (palms together) together during Mass is a way to focus on God, surrender to him, and submit to his will. A reminder that we are not in control, but God is.

Entering our parish church is like walking into our home. Let's revisit the meaning of each of the objects, the surroundings history, and purpose:

Sanctuary –the area, often raised, in the front of the church where the altar, the ambo, the celebrant's chair and, in many churches, the tabernacle are located. Separated from the nave, this is the place reminiscent of the Holy of the Holies, that is, the inner sanctuary of the temple described in the Old Testament. Interestingly, the altar and tabernacle were centuries apart in their introduction into the Church.

Justice Challenge: The First Reading for Sunday is from the Book of Isaiah. Isaiah writes, "I will make you a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth." (Isaiah

49:6) The early Church had to grow into the realization that the "Chosen People" now includes everyone—including people as far away as the ends of the earth! Your challenge this week is to examine your own world. Do you interact with people who are different from you? Does your circle of friends include people of different ages, ethnicity, economic levels, or education? Reflect on how well you bring the good news of Jesus to people beyond your family and friends. How universal is your reach as an evangelizer?

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT "Now the Lord has spoken who formed me as his servant from the womb..."Isaiah 49:5

God have given each of us different gifts. In order for God's plan to work, you have to do what God is calling you to do and I have to do what God is calling me to do. And guess what? God has given each of us a different plan! So, stop comparing yourself to others. Don't let envy and jealousy enter your life. Be thankful for the gifts God has given you and become the saint that God is calling you to be.

Connecting the Gospel...

... to the First Reading: As God formed Isaiah from his mother's womb to be his prophet and a "light to the

nations," so are we called from our baptism to be that same "light to the nations," revealing the Christ in us to all those we meet.



... to experience: We sometimes hear

limited and even trite descriptions of who Jesus is, for example, "Jesus is the answer" or WWJD. But the richness of the mystery of Christ encompasses a breadth and depth that cannot be exhausted in quick answers or pithy statements. Nor can it be exhausted even in a life faithfully lived.

Bite-Sized Faith The Ratzinger family had always stood against the Nazis.

Joseph knew he'd be in trouble if someone found out he'd deserted.

He and his brother Georg had no interest in fighting for the German cause, and their family was firmly anti-Nazi. But like so many other young men in Germany at that time, the two brothers were drafted into the army. Joseph was only eighteen. He never saw combat, and as the war was clearly drawing to a close with the Americans on their way through Germany, he deserted from his unit and returned to his family's farmhouse in Traunstein.

It was a dangerous move. Deserters could be executed on the spot. But the soldiers who stopped him were sympathetic and sent him on his way.



The Americans

Joseph Ratzinger, many yea

came soon after Joseph arrived home and they established headquarters in the farmhouse. Finding out Joseph was a soldier, they marched him along with thousands of others to a POW camp. Providentially, the future Pope Benedict XVI was released with the ending of the war in the summer. He and his brother entered seminary that fall and were ordained in 1951.

This was only the beginning of Joseph Ratzinger's incredible, courageous, unforgettable life. As we mourn his loss, we also give thanks to God for everything He gave us through Joseph's ministry as a priest, bishop, cardinal, and pope. He stands as one of the greatest theologians and scholars of his time, and his thought and legacy will continue to shape and guide the Church even as she endures his passing. Please join us in praying for the peaceful repose of the soul of Pope Benedict XVI:

O God, Who, in Thine ineffable providence, didst will that Thy servant Pope Benedict should be numbered among the high priests, grant, we beseech Thee, that he, who on earth held the place of Thine only begotten Son, may be joined forevermore to the fellowship of Thy holy pontiffs. Through the same Jesus Christ, Thy Son, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Showing Up

I broke my foot once, when my second child was only 12 weeks old, and I was about to move houses. For six weeks I was confined to a chair, a shrieking newborn in my arms, a toddler running circles around me, and my right foot rendered useless by a plaster cast. I couldn't do anything without assistance. I couldn't eat or get a drink or change my clothes or feed my children.

My family was in dire straits. A lot of people offered help, but there was a core group of friends and family members who really saved us.

These are the people who turned up in my driveway with empty vans and cooked meals. These are the people who blocked off their Saturdays to haul furniture, mow our lawn, and run after unruly kids. These are the people who said: "Here I am. Give me a job."

If you've ever really, really needed another person's help, you know that "showing up" means more than saying: "Let me know what you need." It means saying: "I'm already here. Tell me what to do."

So often, I pay lip service to the idea of submission. "What do you want, God?" I ask, and I secretly hope that what He wants isn't one of those things that I'm not willing to give.

What if I really strove to "show up" for God? What if I was ready to give what He asks of me, whatever it is?
