MISSION STATEMENT



Justice Challenge: The First Reading for Sunday is from the prophet Isaiah. We are challenged by God's Word: "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the

naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own" (Isaiah 58:7-8). Your challenge this week is to choose one of the following works of mercy to live out God's Word in the world: 1) go through your closets and donate good clothes to a homeless shelter; 2) go grocery shopping and buy several extra foodstuffs, then donate them to the local food bank or Catholic Charities; or 3) volunteer at a Habitat for Humanity build or donate money or resources to a homeless shelter.

INSIDE OUR SACRED SPACE

Sanctuary Lamp -- A visible lamp or candle burning before the tabernacle. Called the sanctuary lamp, it was first used in the 13th century, and Canon Law 940 requires the lamp to burn continuously. This perpetual light is mentioned in Leviticus 6:6 in discussing the fire for burnt offerings: "Fire shall be kept burning upon the altar continuously; it shall not go out." The flame signifies his presence and a sign that our love for the Lord is eternal, never to be extinguished. * The flame of the tabernacle lamp is purposely transferred from candle to candle beginning with the fire lit at the Easter Vigil Mass. https://www.oursundayvisitor.com/inside-our-sacred-space/

GET FED

"What is true forgiveness?"

The saints—for instance, St. Edmund Campion—give us many examples of this difficult virtue.

For lay Catholics in Elizabethan England, keeping the Faith meant fines, house raids, and imprisonment.

For priests and those who sheltered them, it meant torture and death.

Everyone—Catholics and Anglicans alike—knew this.

Some of the Anglicans, considering Catholics to be traitors to the queen, made a point of helping the police by hunting down Catholic priests themselves.

St. Edmund Campion, a priest, was turned in by such a fellow Englishman. The man hunted him down and gave him over to imprisonment and torture.



Then, one day, Campion's betrayer came to visit him in the Tower.


What did the betrayed and tortured priest do? Reject him? Rebuke him?

No. He forgave him.

He forgave him, and then proceeded to urge the man to leave England, where he was no longer safe. He told him of a Catholic nobleman in Germany who would help him and gave him a letter of introduction to present.

St. Edmund Campion's forgiveness—as well as that of many other saints—went beyond a mere "Forgive and forget" attitude. Such forgiveness, sincere and entire, is difficult. Deep hurt and tough questions hold us back: Why do I have to forgive when I've been wronged? What if they do it again? What if I'm just enabling them? Good Catholic's new series <u>How to Forgive</u> answers all these tough questions. It's a surprising little word — if. For such a short word, it holds an abundance of excuses.

Personally, I could buy a new car if I had a dollar for every time I used the word "if" to explain away my own flaws. "If I wasn't so tired. If we had more money. If the kids weren't always on my last nerve. If I had more talent. If life wasn't so hard."

If, if, if.

I don't always feel like being the salt of the earth. Can't someone else season the dish? Sometimes it's more than I want to give, more than I want to do, more than I want to be. Sharing my bread, sheltering the oppressed, clothing the naked, and accompanying my neighbor — doing these things in the literal or figurative sense can be completely exhausting. Mediocrity is so easy. It's so comfortable.

But if. It looms again, that short but powerful word.

"If" can be deep with excuses, but it can also be wide with possibility. If I bring it all to God. If I stop relying on my own abilities. If I prayed more than I talked. If I make my heart firm. If my faith does not rest on human wisdom.

If not me, who? If not now, when?

"light [that] shall break forth like the dawn." Armed with light and good works, disciples dispel the darkness of the world and shine forth God's saving works.

... **to experience**: When the food served is bland, we salt it. When day

fades into night, we turn on a light. Simple resolutions for everyday needs. Even these simple resolutions, however, involve a choice and require an action on our part.
