Justice Challenge: The Gospel for Sunday is part of the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus is focusing on keeping the commandments. He emphasizes that the Fifth Commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," means more than not taking

someone's life. It also means not being angry or destroying someone's self-esteem by calling them names. Your challenge this week is to look at your life and examine where you might have hurt someone—physically, emotionally through negative gossip, cyber criticism, or derogatory words, or even spiritually by giving bad example. Make a commitment to changing that hurtful behavior, say a prayer for the person you have hurt, and try to have the courage to ask forgiveness in person.

INSIDE OUR SACRED SPACE

Ambo - the focal point for the Liturgy of the Word. From this kind of tall, elevated desk, "only the readings, the responsorial psalm and Easter proclamation (*Exsultet*) are to be proclaimed; it may be used also for giving the homily and for announcing the intentions of the prayer of the faithful" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, No. 309). The design and location of the altar and ambo emphasize the close relationship between the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist: from the holy altar we receive the body and blood of Christ, and from the ambo, Christ's holy doctrine. In this regard the ambo, like the altar, is not just an object but a sacred place.

1 CORINTHIANS 3:1-9

"What is Spiritual Communion?"



When we are not able to receive the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus in the Eucharist, Catholics are encouraged to make a spiritual

communion. What does that mean?

The Baltimore Catechism says that spiritual communion "is an earnest desire to receive Communion in reality, by which desire we make all preparations and thanksgivings that we would make" if we were about to receive Jesus sacramentally in the Eucharist. It is an invitation to Our Lord to dwell within our souls spiritually, even when we can't receive Him in Holy Communion.

The soul which makes a spiritual communion is blessed with abundant graces. Spiritual communion cannot replace sacramental Communion, but it greatly



enriches the soul and fosters constant desire for Our Lord in the Eucharist.

Jesus Himself, speaking to St. Catherine of Siena, told her that He placed her sacramental Communions in a gold

chalice, and her spiritual communions in a silver chalice. "Both chalices are quite pleasing to me," Our Lord said.

While there is no official prayer for making a spiritual communion, St. Alphonsus Liguori's beautiful prayer is a favorite:

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

The method, however, is universal: we prepare for a spiritual communion the way we would prepare to receive Jesus in the Eucharist.

Humbly and reverently, we mentally place ourselves before Our Lord in the tabernacle. With an attitude of contrition for our sins and a desire to receive Jesus, we invite Him into our souls with a prayer. Afterward—just as we would after sacramental Communion—we give thanks for the communion and praise Our Lord. https://www.catholiccompany/getfed

Feelings and Shiny Things

A friend of mine has a tradition on the first birthday of her children. Three items — a coin, a shot glass, and a rosary — are placed in front of the one-year-old, and whatever object he grasps supposedly bears insight into his future. A coin promises wealth, the rosary indicates holiness, and the shot glass...well, I'm sure you can guess.

Of course, the kid just grabs whatever looks coolest. They're not really choosing money or God or a party. Their choice is ruled by impulse.

These days, "I'm not feeling it," is a genuine excuse to avoid something. "I feel that" we say to indicate agreement. "I feel like..." is an acceptable way to offer our opinion. Feelings carry a lot of weight.

Before Christ, there was only the law, and the law dealt primarily with actions. *Do this. Do not do this.* All well and good. But with the fulfillment of the law, Christ wants us to look inwardly. He wants us to consider the influence of our feelings on our actions, and to understand how our chosen actions can, in turn, inspire certain feelings.

I'm a millennial, so, depending on your age, you may think that I feel either too much or too little. One thing I have learned, though, is that when I give my feelings free rein, my instincts immediately turn into actions. I become the toddler grasping at shiny objects with no thought for what they represent. Anger becomes unkindness. Jealousy becomes cruelty. Fear becomes selfishness.

Free will, I have come to understand, means freedom from the tyranny of feelings. If a feeling is strong enough, it can build a prison.

Key words and phrases: law ... fulfill, until all things have taken place, kingdom of heaven, righteousness surpasses

To the point: What does it mean for Jesus to fulfill the law? Jesus sees in the law the means to the fulfillment of time ("until all things have taken place"), when the law will be replaced by righteous relation-



ships within the kingdom of heaven. The fundamental law is gift of self to others. When self-giving is lacking in any act of keeping the law, the law in fact is not kept. We are to keep the law as the way to enter a manner of caring for and relating to others that leads to fullness of Life. Our model for so doing is Jesus. https://liturgy.slu.edu

"For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

MATTHEW 5:20

The Pharisees lived according to the letter of the law and they used this to elevate themselves above the other people. Jesus is clear – it's the love that you have in your heart, for God and others, that will get you to heaven. Simply following church rules to the letter and not out of love, does not necessarily put you on the path to heaven. Attending Sunday Mass and then gossiping about a fellow parishioner on the parking lot is an example of being a modern-day Pharisee.

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time – February 12 Catholics believe marriage to be a sacrament. By this we mean that the faithful love of husband and wife is a sign of Christ's lasting love for us. On this World Marriage Day, let us pray that those who are married seek to bring each other closer to heaven each day.
