# Fourth Sunday of Lent, Cycle A March 19, 2023

Laetare is the first word — meaning "rejoice" — in the Latin text. On LAETARE SUNDAY the Church expresses hope and joy in the midst of our Lenten fasts and penances. Call it pink — or, more fittingly, rose — this change in color indicates a glimpse of the joy that awaits us at Easter, just before we enter into the somber days of Passiontide.



First Reading: 1 Samuel 16:1b,6-7,10-13a Samuel is sent to anoint David as king. Responsorial: Psalm 23:1-6 The Lord is our shepherd. Second Reading: Ephesians 5:8-14 The Ephesians are told to live as children of light. Gospel Reading: John 9:1-41 Jesus heals the man born blind and reveals himself to him as the Son of Man.

Do you give others the benefit of the doubt? And are you gentle with yourself? Do you forgive yourself when you mess up, trusting in a God who forgives infinitely? God is the arbiter of justice, and we are called to trust in God's judgment, which ultimately is so much more merciful than human judgment. Place the world in God's hands this week and stop yourself from judging.

# **INSIDE OUR SACRED SPACE ~ Baptismal Font**

Baptism is the door to all the Church's sacraments. The baptistry or baptismal font is part of every Catholic Church and located so that the congregation can participate in the baptismal ceremony.

Some fonts are large pools with free-flowing water and normally found as you enter the nave; others are smaller and placed in different locations.



The early converts to Christianity were baptized in rivers, streams, public baths, some even in the catacombs. For the most part, it wasn't until the fourth century with the construction of churches that baptisms were brought

indoors.


Over the centuries, even until recently, the receptacle

for baptisms has used been continuously reduced in size. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' document "Built on Living Stones" says for each parish that, "One font



that will accommodate the baptism of both infants and adults symbolizes the one faith and one baptism that Christians share."

## Who made the first Way of the Cross?

The Stations as we know them were born of tradition nearly as old as the Church. Who do we thank for this beautiful devotion? An Apostle? Or a saint?

Actually, we owe our thanks to the Blessed Mother. According to an ancient tradition, it was she who made the first Way of the Cross. Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich, one of the Church's modern mystics and visionaries, relates to us some of the details, as they were revealed to her, of how this devotion came about.

After the Ascension, Our Lady immersed herself in the contemplation and remembrance of the Passion. Blessed Anne tells us that she went out daily and traced the route of the Cross through Jerusalem.

The Blessed Mother, relates Bl. Anne, was grave

and shed "tears of compassion" as she walked the Way.

When the Blessed Mother moved from Jerusalem to Ephesus, she



quickly marked a space for replicating the Way. Blessed Anne Catherine describes the new Way, saving:

Soon after her arrival at her new home [in *Ephesus*] the way up the hill behind her house to carru out this devotion. At first she went by herself, measuring the number of steps, places of Our Lord's different sufferings. At each of these places she put up a stone, or, *if there was already a tree there, she made* a mark upon it. The way led into a wood, and upon a hill in this wood she had marked the place of Calvary, and the grave of Christ in a little cave in another hill.

Bl. Anne goes on to explain that at first, the Blessed Mother made this Way alone. Later, she brought her maidservant with her to meditate on the Passion and praise Our Lord for it. After her Assumption, the site became well-known by Christians. They made access to the Way easier, beautifying it with both material and spiritual attentions.

Our Lady, in making the first Way, gave us a tremendous gift. The Stations of the Cross that are erected in every Catholic Church, and which are traditionally prayed by Christians on Fridays-especially during Lentare a spiritual heritage given to us directly from Our **Blessed Mother!**

I don't know Fr. Stu personally, but I've heard a fair number of his homilies. I think it is safe to assume that if he and I were to get into a discussion on any number of things, from church history to liturgical music to stand-up comedy, each of us would cringe at the opinions of the other.

But Fr. Stu happens to offer just about the only confession time within 20 miles of me that consistently works with my schedule. That means that, guite by accident, Fr. Stu is my regular confessor. For years now, he's sat patiently on the other side of the grille, listening to me pour out the details of my transgressions, from the pathetic to the embarrassing, and he absolves me of my sins.

In the Gospel, Christ links vision with humility and pride with blindness. We see again and again in Scripture how God delights in surprising us, in revealing himself through people, places, and experiences we not only didn't expect but perhaps had totally written off.

We are right to be proud of the truth, but we are wrong if the truth causes us to be proud of ourselves. The truth no more belongs to the one who believes it than sight belongs to the blind man in the Gospel. A gift does not reflect on the recipient. It reflects on the giver.

After a great deal of thought, I've decided to be grateful that God contrived to give me a confessor whom I strongly disagree with on so many things. It's a powerful reminder of how much I must receive from other people, even those I may think are wrong. In that confessional, Fr. Stu is only a priest, and I am only a sinner.

Key words and phrases: made clay with the saliva, smeared the clay on his eyes, I am, Jesus ... anointed my eves, You are that man's disciple, I do believe

To the point: In making clay from his own saliva and smearing it on the blind man's eves, Jesus re-creates the man by



transferring something of his own being to the man. The man is anointed by Jesus as "I am" and comes to be a stalwart, believing disciple. Not even the powerful Pharisees can sway him from his testimony to the work of Jesus in him. In baptism we, too, encounter Jesus and become a new creation in him.
