Justice Challenge: The Gospel Sunday recounts the story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead. It is eloquent to read that Jesus wept when he saw how devastated Lazarus' friends and relatives were about his friend's death. Jesus showed such compassion and human emotion. The word compassion is from the Latin words com (meaning with) and pati (to suffer). Compassion, then, is suffering with others who are hurting. Your challenge this week is to show compassion to someone who is suffering. You might donate money to CRS or another organization helping hurting people. Or you might give a sandwich to a homeless person in your community. Whatever you do, remember that compassion means entering into that person's human condition, not with condescension, but with a genuine sense of walking with them in their experience.

INSIDE OUR SACRED SPACE ~ Easter Candle

The Easter (or Paschal) candle is located near the baptismal font, the exception being during the Easter season when it is placed next to the ambo. Originating around the fourth century, this large candle represents the light of Christ, and a new Paschal candle is blessed during each Easter Vigil. It is lit for every baptism, and the flame, the light of Christ, is transferred to a candle given to



the baptized individual or to an adult family member when an infant is baptized. * *The Easter candle is also lit during a funeral, recognizing that the deceased shared in the death and resurrection of Jesus at their baptism.* <u>https://www.oursundayvisitor.com/inside-our-sacred-space/</u>



Do you know what "intercessory prayer" really means?

When you need the help of the saints, intercessory prayer is your go-to.

There are various forms of prayer. The best-known form—and what most people mean when they say "prayer"—is petitionary prayer. That is, petitionary prayer is the act of asking for gifts or graces from God.

This is why our Protestant brethren are



scandalized when we say we "pray" to the saints. They say it is wrong to pray to saints, because it treats them as though they were God and had the *power* to grant gifts or graces.

Put this way, the Protestant argument is correct. It *would* be wrong to "pray" to the saints if we thought that "praying to the saints" meant that a saint was using their own, self-derivative powers to bring about grace...or if prayer was identical with "worship," which is for God alone.

This is not, however, the sense we are using when we as Catholics pray to the saints. The word prayer simply means "to ask," not "to worship." As the *Catholic Encyclopedia* clarifies:

[W]hen we pray to [the saints], it is to ask for their intercession in our behalf, not to expect that they can bestow gifts on us of their own power or obtain them in virtue of their own merit. —Catholic Encyclopedia

This is what we mean by intercessory prayer: the saints *intercede* for us. James 5:16 says that "The prayer of a righteous man has great power in its effects." Since the saints are perfect, and are in heaven with God, their prayers have great efficacy. So we ask them to turn to God *on our behalf* and ask *Him* to bestow the proper graces and gifts upon us.

Though our prayers are far less perfect than those of the saints, we *can* and *should* intercede for each other, as well. This is what is happening when we promise to pray for someone else—we are practicing *intercessory prayer*.

Prayer of the Faithful: That we open our hearts to see God's active presence in our daily lives and become "partakers of the divine nature."



Offer it up. My grandmother used this phrase with her children, and my mother, in turn, used it with me. It's a kind of verbal heirloom, a gift of wisdom from a generation that knew suffering all too well.

We know it to be true that God will work through our suffering if we invite him to. We know it and we have seen it — we have only to look at Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary.

God to do something very specific with it. Teach me this, please. Give me this specific grace. Show me this specific answer.

The happy ending in today's Gospel is not the alleviation of the sorrow Martha and Mary feel because it isn't alleviated, Lazarus is still human, and death still awaits him. Someday, his sisters will have to mourn at his tomb. That loss and pain will not be avoided.

The happy ending is that he is resurrected now, and in doing so, brings so many to belief. The happy ending is that Martha and Mary do not abandon discipleship because things didn't work out exactly the way that they wanted. They run out to meet Christ, eyes dim with tears. They fling themselves into his company and onto his providence.

They made an offering of their suffering, and their happy ending is that their offering was accepted.

... **to First Reading**: Ezekiel describes God's desire to untie Israel from the grave of their captivity and lead them back to the freedom of their land where they can renew their

covenantal relationship with God. In the gospel Jesus commands the bystanders concerning the raised Lazarus to "Untie him and let him go [free]."



... *to experience*: Our experiences of living can sometimes limit us. For example, when

a friend has hurt us, we can become leery of deep relationships. In other words, "once bitten, twice shy." But if we never allow Jesus to break open the limits of our human experiences, we can never receive the unexpected gifts of freedom and Life he offers. <u>https://liturgy.slu.edu</u>
