One of the most recognizable aspects of the **Feast of Corpus Christi** is the solemn procession. These processions date back to the 13th century and



involve the public display of the Blessed Sacrament. The procession moves through the streets, from one church to another allowing the faithful to express their devotion and bear witness to their faith in the real presence of Christ. During the procession, the Eucharist is placed in a monstrance and enshrined beneath a canopy. This symbolizes Christ's presence among His people and His reign over all creation. As the procession advances, the faithful offer prayers, sing hymns, and meditate on the significance of the Eucharist in their lives. The streets become a visible manifestation of faith, with believers joining together to honor and adore Christ.

Please save the date for a Corpus Christi Procession on June 11 from 2:30-4:30 pm, from Sacred Heart Cathedral to Immaculate Conception Church.



**Justice Challenge:** Today we celebrate a mystery—the mystery that is the Most Holy Trinity, three Persons yet one God. The Trinity exists in perfect communion and community as Father, Son, and Spirit.

God doesn't just give perfect love—God is Love, and that love reveals itself in the relationship of Father, Son, and Spirit. Your challenge this week is to make the connection between love and justice. As Pope Benedict wrote in Caritas in Veritate, "Love - caritas - is an extraordinary force which leads people to opt for courageous and generous engagement in the field of justice and peace. It is a force that has its origin in God, Eternal Love and Absolute Truth." Reflect this week on the following questions (as individuals and as families): "How does God's love for us compel us to take action to fight injustice? Who needs our love the most this weekin the family, in our community, and in our world? How can we share our love? Is it through service, advocacy, financial support, or something else?" Select one way of living justice through the lens of love—and do it!

## Mary, Mother of the Church: What is the significance of today's (5/29) feast?

The feast of Pentecost was possible because of our Blessed Mother.

Yesterday, we celebrated the "birthday" of the Church, as Pentecost is traditionally called.

Today, in complementary fashion, we honor Mary in her title of Mother of the Church. Although this feast is a



new one—created in 2018 by Pope Francis—this title is one of the Blessed Mother's oldest titles.

The early Church Fathers—such as St. Augustine of Hippo—liked to speak of her as the Mother of the Church. It reminds us that Mary is the means by which our Salvation came into the world. She gave birth to Christ so that our souls could be born anew in His Church.

Moreover, after Jesus formed the Church, He gave her into the maternal care of His own Mother.

From the Cross, Jesus entrusted the Blessed Mother and St. John to each other's care. The Church traditionally holds that St. John represented every soul who has ever been and ever will be baptized into the Church.

When Jesus said to Mary, "Woman, behold your son," He gave not only St. John but also His entire Church into her maternal keeping. Since then, she has unfailingly protected us, and in return we take her into our souls and run to her as our perfect, loving Mother.

As devotion to our Blessed Mother grows, the list of her titles lengthens. Currently she has fifty-three titles expressing the honor, supplication, and thanksgiving with which we regard our dear Mother.

# **Live The Liturgy**



The Church is one, holy, catholic, and apostolic. That oneness is mirrored for us in the Holy Trinity: one God in three Persons. We are a diverse community with different backgrounds, cultures, realities, and gifts, but we are truly one. Unfortunately, we too often forget this and function as a fractioned body. We needlessly compete against one another, judge one another as opposed to help, and sit silent when our brothers and sisters call out for help.

When we take seriously our way of life, we see our lives as not truly belonging to ourselves. We want to offer our very existence to God and the Body of Christ. If we find that we are resistant to that fullness of generosity, or we begin to use our gifts in a way that fractures community, we then actively work in contrast to this mark of the Church.

The Church that was established by Jesus and fortified by the institution of the sacraments cannot be deprived of Her four marks. The human element may be strained and injured, but not even the gates of hell will prevail against this institution alive in the Spirit. Our actions can either bear witness to that reality or it can bring offense. Let us pray that enough of us will choose the holy way so all the world may see that God is real, Jesus is alive, and we are ONE. ©LPi



June 16: Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus dates back to the time of the Apostles. This devotion honors Jesus' burning

love for each of us and also makes reparation for the rejection, persecution, and disdain His Sacred Heart receives from the world.


**The Heart itself.** The heart is the symbolic center of feeling and emotion, and it represents Jesus' deep love and affection for us. Red signifies fervent love, and Jesus loves us so much that he laid down his life for us (Jn 15:13).

**The Crown of Thorns**. The heart typically is encircled horizontally with a crown of thorns. The thorns represent the stings caused by our sins.

**The Wound.** Often there is a gash shown on the lower left or lower center of the heart which recalls when the soldier thrust his lance into Jesus' side (Jn 19:34).

**Droplets of Blood.** Some artists show a few droplets flowing from the wound, and in a few instances, they are caught by a chalice below. This recalls the Last Supper when Jesus offered a cup of wine and said, "This is my blood of the covenant which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins" (Mt 26:28).

**The Flames.** A number of flames are usually shown above the upper, center of the heart, and they represent the intensity of the warmth of Jesus' love. https://thecatholicspirit.org
