

Thanksgiving week was National Bible Week. U.S. President Franklin D.
Roosevelt commemorated the word of God by observing the first National Bible Week in 1941. National Bible Week is supported by the U.S. Catholic Bishops and also marks

the anniversary of the Second Vatican Council document *Dei Verbum* or *Dogmatic Constitution*. The bible is is a detailed, long-preserved snapshot of an ancient culture and religion. This religious text offers hope, strength, and guidance to navigate during difficult times. Following is a timeline:

1200 B.C. – The first texts of the original Jewish Bible were written.

125 A.D. – The oldest manuscript of the New Testament is written on a papyrus fragment.

175 A.D. – The first translation of the New Testament to Latin.

1384 – English interpretation by John Wycliffe translates the Bible in common vernacular.

1454 – German inventor Johannes Gutenberg introduced printing to the European world, producing the first printed Bible.

1611 – The King James Version (Protestant version) of the Bible is published after being commissioned and promulgated in 1604 by James I of England for use in Anglican church.

1941 – The First National Bible Week is observed to help Americans grieve the Pearl Harbor Tragedy.

What is the St. Andrew's Novena?



This beloved Advent tradition begins Nov. 30th.

The St. Andrew's Novena-which begins on this Apostle's feast day—consists of a short, beautiful prayer that is recited fifteen times a day in honor of Our Lord's Nativity.

It is not a novena in the literal sense of the word, because it lasts much longer than nine days—beginning on November 30th and finishing on Christmas Eve, which makes it 25 days long. (If you're a numbers person, that means this novena prayer is recited a total of 375 times!)



The tradition is of uncertain origin, but possibly began in Ireland about a century ago and has become immensely popular.

Like most novenas, it is not only a sincere act of devotion, but also a way to offer God the intentions that are close to your heart. It is piously believed that those who pray this novena faithfully will receive what they ask.

The prayer is as follows:

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires, through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His blessed Mother. Amen.

You can pray the fifteen iterations all at once, rosary-style, or you can break them up throughout the day.

Of all the many wonderful, thorough examinations of conscience I have come across, the one I normally utilize is very simple, and perfectly suited to someone like me who is not capable of profound thought at the end of the day.

It's just one very short question: Which Christs did I not recognize today?

The King always comes in disguise, and I know I miss him in so many ways every single day. I miss him in people ignored or dismissed. I miss him in opportunities avoided and in moments that could have turned into prayer but instead turned into phone-scrolling. I miss him when he is right in front of me, holding up a mirror and calling my name, begging for my conversion of heart.

The Christian life calls us to constant self-scrutiny. It's not a comfortable life, always thinking about what you could do better, but the Lord shepherds us rightly. His pastures have nothing to offer those who are perfect and

He has gone in search of the lost. He has reclaimed those who have strayed, healed those who were injured, given rest to those who were weary.

We can't be followers of Christ if we are not willing to own our sins. God's mercy does not dismiss our sins, as if they never existed and were not important.

No, it does something far, far better — God's mercy absolves our sins. It sets us free from them. But to be truly free, you have to understand the tyranny of what once enslaved

The New Liturgical Year begins with Advent: The start of



a new seasonal cycle begins on **December 3**, and also marks the transition from one lectionary cycle to the next. We finish cycle A today (*Nov. 26*) and start cycle B next Sunday. We move from St. Mathhew and his Gospel to St. Mark and His Gospel.

St. Mark's Gospel is now generally regarded as the earliest Gospel

and sometimes called the Gospel of Suffering. He presents Jesus as a wise teacher and powerful and compassionate healer. He insists that Jesus can be properly understood only when we confront the mystery of the cross and Jesus' identity as a suffering Messiah.

The first reading at mass, usually comes from the Old Testament, reflecting on important themes from the Gospel reading.

The second reading is usually from one of the epistles, a letter written to an early church community read semi-continuously. Each Sunday we pick up where we left off.
