

Why do we call the Holy Innocents martyrs?

The youngest and most innocent gave their lives for Christ.

Christmas is all things beautiful: consolation, awe, gratitude, and joy.

Yet during this happy time of year, the Church invites us to ponder and remember the violent deaths of some of our most glorious martyrs: the Holy Innocents.

Today, in the midst of our Christmas joy, we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Innocents, also known as Childermas. This feast commemorates the children slaughtered by the barbaric King Herod, whose goal was to kill the Christ Child and preserve his own power. The Holy Innocents died in Christ's stead so that He could die in ours.

Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah:

A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they were no more. —Matthew 2:16-18

We consider the Holy Innocents to be some of the first martyrs of the Church. Although they were too young to proclaim Christ with their voices, they proclaimed Him with their lives. When they sacrificed their lives for a Name they did not know, they shed their blood just as He would later in His life. The Holy Innocents died because of Him and for Him. They gave their precious lives so that God's plan could be fulfilled in Him.

Although these innocent children were not baptized Christians nor able to enter martyrdom willingly, they are considered martyrs through Christ. Just as Christ makes saints of babies in water baptism every day, he gave the Holy Innocents the grace of becoming saints and martyrs.

While our Christmas joy is tinged with sadness on this particular day, we celebrate these children's glorious place in heaven and their incredible gift to us all.

Now, the Holy Innocents reign in heaven in the company of the saints and angels. Often, because the saints dwell in heaven, we think of them as distant and different from us. However, this is not true! The saints lived lives like ours and long for us to join them in heaven. Dr. Scott Hahn's beloved book, Angels and Saints – A Biblical Guide to Friendship with God's Holy Ones, is a powerful account of the lives of the saints that demonstrates how we can model our own lives off their own very human ones. By exploring the variety of saints (and some angels too!), this book becomes a roadmap to living a saintly life just as they did. https://www.catholiccompany.com

The Sword and the Family



In the first few weeks of parenthood, the tears flowed fast and freely, and with very little provocation.

Sometimes I wept because it was getting dark out, and sometimes because the sun was coming up. Sometimes I wept because the days were so unbearably long. Sometimes I wept because they were so cruelly short and slipped past so quickly, bearing away with them forever these inaugural moments of my daughter's life — moments I knew I would long for on my deathbed.

So, the inclusion of the Presentation of Christ in the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary has always struck me. The Blessed Mother, just a few weeks after giving birth, standing at the holy temple: Is she tired? Is she emotional? Is she frightened? Is she happy? We cannot know for sure, but if she is anything like most of the postpartum women I know, she is all four. But she stands there dutifully, offering her baby to the Lord, and this is what she is told, "A sword shall pierce your heart."

Joyful? I would have snatched the baby back, called the police and sobbed for a week.

But Mary knows that Simeon speaks the truth, and she cannot receive God's will with anything less than joy, even if it means a pierced heart.

Family means love, but love means — what, exactly? Pleasure, fulfillment, contentment? Yes, but so much more, too. Love means you have much to lose.

How full is family life with these beautiful moments which, on the surface, look and feel painful — but hold within them the opportunity to be like Mary, to bow our heads and once again say "Yes, Lord."
