Justice Challenge: The Gospel reading for Sunday describes Jesus healing people all day, and then getting up the next morning to be deeply absorbed in prayer. Jesus cared for the poor and the sick and those marginalized by

society. But he never forgot the source of the healing which he did—his heavenly Father, whom he called "Abba," or "Dad." He kept in close contact with the Father throughout his life. Your challenge this week is to reflect on the relationship between prayer and action in your own lives—as individuals and as a family or household. Do you have a healthy and holy pattern of prayer which is part of your daily routine? Do you let that prayer lead you to the actions which God wants you to take to help heal a hurting world? Remember that part of a vibrant prayer life is letting God speak once you are done. Listen to what God wants you to do just as Jesus did when he lived on earth. https://pastoral.center

Connecting the Gospel...

... to the First Reading: Job describes the misery of the human condition when he laments that his life is filled with "drudgery"—he feels trapped ("is a slave") and is "without hope." This also describes the condition of the people who came to Jesus for healing. Jesus overturns the human condition, bringing hope and healing-then and now.



... to experience: A sick child instinctively seeks the touch of a loving parent; he or she wants the parent to sit by the bed, to be near. Even as adults, when we are ill or down-and-out, we seek comfort from a trusted and caring other who grasps our hand: As the gospel illustrates, in times of trouble we need the personal touch and presence of another. https://liturgy.slu.edu

SHARING GOOD NEWS

"That evening, at sundown, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases and cast out many demons."

Mark 1:22

Adults: When have you felt the sadness of Job? When have you felt the joy of those who witnessed the healing works of Jesus??

Kids: What could you do this week to comfort someone sad?



My loved one has left the Church. What do I do?

The answer is simpler than you may expect!

We've all seen it before.

Whether it's your child, sibling, or friend, we all know someone who has left the Catholic Faith.

No matter your relationship with the person, it is always painful to see the treasury and graces of the Catholic Church left abandoned by one who needs them the most.

When a loved one leaves the Church, you may understandably feel frustrated or confused. You may fear for their soul, mourn the loss of their companionship in the Faith, or be hurt by their rejection of something you hold so dear.

However you feel, we all understand the importance of praying for their return back to the truth of the Catholic Church. But we can feel overwhelmed...What are we supposed to say to them?

How can we help them see what they have lost?

Each person is different. Each walk of faith will vary. However, there is one thing that will be certain to help: *letting love fill your heart*.

In his beloved book, *Search and Rescue: How to Bring Your Family and Friends into-or Back into-the Catholic Church*, Patrick Madrid recognizes the absolute necessity of love when helping a loved one return to the Church.

Drawing from the wisdom of the saints, Patrick Madrid writes:

"The key to success in your own search-and-rescue mission lies in the quiet recesses of your own heart: love. To win your family and friends to the Faith, you must develop the heart of an apostle (one who is sent) – a heart full of love for Christ and for souls."

Recognizing that this is easier said than done, Madrid goes on to give helpful guidance on how to achieve this heart of an apostle:



- 1. Prayer
- 2. Absolute trust in God
- 3. Humility
- 4. Perseverance
- 5. Love

So, if you are longing for a loved one to return to the Catholic Church, do not despair! Remember that Christ is longing for their return right alongside you and that He will fight for their love! In the meantime, focus on cultivating a heart of love that will help draw them towards the profound reality of Christ's Love.

But couldn't she rest? Couldn't she serve him later? Couldn't she thank him with a smile and take a nap? Well, I suppose. But is that how you react to a miracle?

I have received my miracle — my family. My purpose. So why am I still lying down?
