She didn't hesitate to express her strong opinions about why this or that person had fallen into poverty. The staff and the pastor suggested that she not be so quick to judge, but to no avail. She really thought she knew people and that it was her right to have and express her opinions. One day, a pregnant woman with three small children came to the office for help. Jeanne remarked to the woman that she obviously couldn't afford the children she had so why another one? The woman bowed her head for a minute and then lifted it and said, "This is my first one actually. The three with me are my sister's children. She and her husband died in a car accident two months ago. We were blessed to be given custody of the children. Of course we weren't prepared for this, and I had to quit work to care for them, and we are temporarily in a bind." https://pastoral.center

Focusing the Gospel

Key words and phrases: This is how it is, kingdom of God, scatter seed, harvest has come, seed ... sown, becomes the largest of plants

To the point: "This is how it is," Jesus says in this Gospel. Yet there is no single way to describe the "kingdom of God." Here Jesus uses two similar parables to teach us that the kingdom is

realized in the intersection of our own work (plant the seed) with God's work (the mystery of life growing and bearing fruit). The Good News is that God's kingdom is assured—the scattered seed will yield a harvest; the tiny seed will grow into a large plant. "This is [really] how it is!" https://liturgy.slu.edu



It's time to address the oliphaunt in the room \dots

Catholic bookworms everywhere have something to acknowledge.

There's been an epidemic in Catholic communities for decades and it's time we address it.

Catholics are obsessed with The Lord of the Rings.

What is this obsession? Where does it come from?

Well, it's actually no coincidence that Catholics are drawn to The Lord of the Rings. It goes beyond our shared faith with Tolkien; it goes back to the nature of fantasy and fairy tales.

As it turns out, Catholicism is very compatible with fairy tales!

Fairy tales reflect the truth that the supernatural and natural exist together. In their depictions of fairies disguised in flowers, spirits in water and the wind, and ogres hiding under bridges, fairy tales recognize that the world is not exactly as it seems—that there is a beautiful spiritual reality beyond the material world we perceive.

In fairy tales, talking animals and pumpkins turning into golden carriages are regular occurrences. Although this may seem drastically different from our own reality, we must remind ourselves that things like miracles and God's wonderful providence are just as commonplace. This is one of the things fairy tales can teach us: miracles can happen, and with help from God's grace, all things are possible.

Beyond an awareness of the spiritual and the supernatural, fairy tales offer their readers another important lesson: good will always triumph in the end. In the best fantasy stories, the wicked witch is served justice, and the virtuous prince wins the beautiful maiden's heart.

Our favorite fairy tale author, J.R.R. Tolkien, said it best: "Fairy tales are not primarily concerned with possibility, but with desirability."

In showing us the way things should be, they inspire us to make the world a better place.

So, read your children fairy tales and read them yourself! Goodness and wonder are not things one should ever outgrow!

However, keep two things in mind: 1. There are options beyond Tolkien(!), and 2. There are a lot of bad fairy tales and fantasy stories out there, so choose wisely!

Want a fairy tale collection that you know reflects the good, the true, and the beautiful? We recommend *The Golden Key and Other Fairy Tales* by George Macdonald. According to C.S. The Perfect Storm



I am writing this on a Saturday morning. Saturdays are my writing days, when my husband takes over the kids and the house and I disappear into the office with an enormous cup of coffee and noise-canceling headphones. Saturdays are sacred — if work can be called sacred.

But Saturday morning is also the only time I'm able to consistently get to confession. Every other time the sacrament is offered in my area during the week, I seem to have unavoidable commitments — but on Saturday morning, all I have is work, and how can I let work come before a sacrament, as much as I might secretly want to?

I've spent a good deal of time being bitter about this, because it's just not convenient, having to carve out time from work to run to the other side of town, especially when I get there and there's a line. I sit there in the sanctuary, waiting my turn, checking the clock, stewing, fretting. Obsessing over forgetting one of my sins. Thinking of how much work I have when I get home.

Saturday mornings: a perfect storm, I sometimes call it in my head.

I forge ahead, though. I've never gotten up and dashed back to my desk. I make it into the confessional and I stammer out my pathetic little list and receive absolution. Then I go before the tabernacle to perform my penance.

It's while I am kneeling there that it happens. Always. God awakens, and he cries into the depths of my heart: "Quiet! Be still! Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"

After teaching all day by the shore of the sea, Jesus asks his disciples to remove him from the crowds. He wants to escape the noise, the clamor, the disquiet. But the clamor follows him, because the world is full of it. Storms crop up wherever we go.

Jesus sleeps through the storm, because he understands what the disciples do not: the storms of the world cannot hurt us. They are only so much noise.
