Catholic Definition: Retreat

Withdrawal for a period of time form one's usual surroundings and occupation to a place of solitude for meditation, selfexamination, and prayer, in order to make certain necessary decisions in one's spiritual life. Although the practice is older than Christianity, the example of Christ's forty days in the desert makes such retreats part of divine revelation, to be imitated, as far as possible, by his followers. As a formal devotion among all classes of the faithful, retreats were introduced with the Counter-Reformation, led by St. Ignatius of Loyola, and followed by St. Francis de Sales and St. Vincent de Paul. Retreats for a specified number of days are required of all priests and religious. "We desire," wrote Pope Pius XI, "that retreat houses, where persons withdraw for a month, or for eight days, or for fewer, to put themselves into training for the perfect Christian life..."

What made Pope Gregory the Great so great?

Maybe a story from his papacy will help us understand...

As pope, Gregory had a formal nightly meal. Rather than taking this meal alone, Gregory had a tradition of inviting 12 poor men to dine with him every evening, honoring the 12 Apostles by serving those in need.

One evening, as the meal was about to begin, a 13th guest unexpectedly arrived at the door—a beggar who looked even more destitute than the others.

He had not expected a 13th guest, he had not prepared enough food for 13, and he had no idea who this poor man was. It would have been easy to turn this beggar away and say that serving 12 poor men at his table was enough.

However, without hesitation, Gregory welcomed the ragged man in, making room at the table.

But something strange was afoot. When Gregory asked his steward to help prepare an extra seat, the steward was

bewildered: he could only see 12 guests!

Despite the strangeness, and even with stretched resources, Gregory ensured that the beggar was fed and treated with the same dignity as the other guests.

As the evening went on, Gregory found himself strangely captivated by the 13th guest. Each time he glanced at this particular man, his appearance seemed to change—sometimes the man looked youthful,

while at other moments, his face seemed older and more distinguished. There was something familiar about him that Gregory couldn't quite place.

Eventually, curiosity got the better of him, and Gregory approached the man to ask who he really was. The man answered: "I am your angel, whom God sent to test your charity."

Gregory then realized why the steward was not able to see this 13th guest.

From then on, Pope Gregory devoted himself even more to the poor. He cultivated deep humility and led as a servant. It was these qualities that allowed him to go on and do great things for God. His influence on Christian civilization and European history in general was so profound as to earn him the title "the Great." He is among those we call the "Fathers of the Church" and is one of the four great Doctors of the Western Church.

(Practicing) Catholic – Recognize God in your Ordinary Moment)
BE OPENED



There are several moments throughout the calendar year when we are tricked into thinking we can reinvent ourselves.

One of them is New Year's Day. The barista at my coffee shop told me that they sell more decaf coffee in January than in the entirety of the remaining year, because everyone is swearing off caffeine. By February, she said, the trend subsides: folks have realized they're not actually superheroes just because the last digit of the year has increased by one.

The beginning of a new school year is another of those moments. Every pencil is freshly sharpened, and every lesson plan is painstakingly plotted. Our heads are full of what we plan to do this year, how we plan to do it, who we plan to become.

But by May, the wind is out of our sails. We've learned the concepts, we've used up the pencils, yes — but we've remembered that underneath it all we're basically the same people, with the same shortcomings and the same obstacles as we always were. The only difference in September was we had new planners.

The truth is that we cannot reinvent ourselves. We can't change ourselves at all, not on New Year's Day or the first day of school or on our 40th birthday or after quitting a bad habit. We are what we are: blind in some ways, deaf in others, crippled in still more, moving through life with uncertainty, stumbling in the dark.

People don't change. Not without miracles.

But being a Christian means believing in miracles and being ready for them at any moment — in January or in September, in the middle of a hopeless week or at the end of a bad day, when you feel strong and when you don't, when you want to be better and when you feel too tired to try.

No, we can't change ourselves, but we can be changed. There is one who can change us if we will let him. He is waiting — now, tomorrow, yesterday, next week. The time is always right for a miracle.
