# Why do we put ashes on our heads every year?

Isn't that a little bit...Old Testament-y?

Yes, it's very much Old Testament-y!

The people of Nineveh performed penance in sackcloth and ashes after Jonah delivered God's message to them.

Job scattered ash on his food when everything he possessed was taken from him.



The early Church adopted the Jewish custom of ash as an external symbol of penance or grief:

In the Old Law ashes were generally a symbolic expression of grief, mourning, or repentance. In the Early Church, the use of ashes had a like signification and with sackcloth formed part of the public penances.

—The Roman Catholic Daily Missal, 1962 So why ash?

Ash represents our mortality; just as ashes are the remains of wood consumed by fire, so our bodies will be reduced to dust after we die. We recall our mortality to practice humility, reminding ourselves of our extreme lowliness and the brevity of earthly life.

Traditionally, the forty days of Lent represent Our Lord's forty-day fast in the desert. For us, the forty days mark a period of penance and prayer as we accompany Our Lord on the road leading to His Passion.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and the cross of ash upon our foreheads to remind us that we ought to repent of our sins, especially during the Lenten season.

Ash Wednesday is here. The season of penance has begun. How are you going to observe Lent this year? You can find many digital sites that will help guide you each day in your spiritual retreat during the 40 days of Lent.

The Log in Your Eye



Today's Gospel is a big favorite of non-Christians — or Christians who don't like being told what to do.

That trusty ol' remove the wooden beam from your own eyeline is a classic. Mind your business, Christians! You're not perfect either.

And that's entirely true. None of us are perfect. We've all got logs in our eyes. We can't approach life acting like we have the answers simply because we follow Jesus.

Jesus has the answers, and we have Jesus. The real problem with having someone remove a splinter from my eye, if he himself has a log in his eye, is not that he has no business removing the splinter from my eye. It's that he can't see clearly to do it. His own eyesight is occluded.

If we see a splinter in another person's eye, or a problem in the world that needs to be fixed, or a scandal in the community that should be addressed, what Jesus is saying is not that we should ignore it and move on. He's merely saying that, when we see these things, we must take them first as a challenge to examine ourselves. To address the problem as it exists within our own souls, so that we ensure we are seeing clearly. Then, if we reach out to pluck the splinter, we will do so with clear eyesight.

He wants us to worry as much about our own souls as we do about other people's.

We tend to look at the world and feel anxious — so much evil!

So much hate! So much sin! We pray, God, when will you change it?

And He whispers back: I will change it here. Now. In your own heart. You just have to ask.

# Lent and Holy Week (46 Days)

- It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday.
- A time of preparation for the celebration of the Easter Resurrection.
- Liturgy prepares catechumens for initiation into the Church on Easter.
- Liturgy prepares the faithful by recalling their baptism, their uniting to the saving work of Jesus.
- Time recalls the frailties and sinfulness of the human condition and calls us to perfection through prayers and penance.
- The forty days from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday remind us of the 40 years the Jews wandered in the desert before God allowed them to enter the Holy Land and of the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert before his public life.

At the start of Lent, we should ask ourselves – what pulls me away from loving God, loving others, and loving myself well? How can I incorporate acts of sacrifice, acts of giving, and acts of prayer that will help me love as God loves?

Giving thought to observing Lent is important. Whether you wait until the last minute to decide, or you've known your Lenten sacrifice since *last* Lent, it's worth spending time to thoughtfully consider how to make the most of your experience this year.
