Sacramental confession, reception of the Holy Eucharist and prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father are still required.

Plenary Indulgence is an aid for the real conversion that leads to eternal happiness. The granting of an indulgence by the church is "the expression of the church's full confidence of being heard by the Father when, in view of Christ's merits and, by his gift, those of Our Lady and the saints, she asks him to mitigate or cancel the painful aspect of punishment by fostering its medicinal aspect through other channels of grace," the late pope said.

Commentary on the Readings for the Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost

"When Jesus came to the ruler's house and saw the flute players and the crowd making a din, He said,



'Begone, the girl is asleep, not dead.' And they laughed Him to scorn. But when the crowd had been put out, He went in and took her by the hand; and the girl arose" (Gospel).

Notice the small flute-playing figures at the left. They represent *the crowd* of people who laugh their Creator *to scorn*. Yet how often we move among them, enjoying what we call "life," even though we may be spiritually dead.

The trumpet-blowing angel at the right, summoning the dead to life, represents how Jesus, after *the crowd has been put out* by us, raises His *Hand* over us in absolution, extends His *Hand* to us in Holy Communion. St. Paul, too, warns us against these; enemies *of the cross of Christ* whose *end is ruin*, whose *god is the belly*."

Stewardship Moment for Nov 8, 2020

"Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." - Matthew 25:13

SACRAMENTAL IMPORTANCE OF FIRSTCOMMUNION & PENANCE



First Communion is the second of the Seven Sacraments of the Catholic Church, one of the three sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Eucharist & Confirmation) – the *foundations* of our Christian life. It is considered one of the most important occasions in a Roman Catholic's life. We receive Jesus Christ, who gives Himself to us

in His body, blood, soul, and divinity. This intimate union with Christ both signifies and strengthens our union with Him and His Church

Jesus did not abandon us when He ascended into Heaven. We worship Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament during the Mass, at Eucharistic Adoration, and where He is present in the tabernacle. But one of the most important and intimate ways that we share in His presence is when we receive Holy Communion where we are united more closely to Jesus. He has given us his most precious gift - a sign that we are living in communion with His Church, following the teachings that Jesus has handed down to us.

Each time we receive the Holy Communion well, we not only receive the Body of Christ, but become more deeply united To Christ in His Body, the Church. The great gift calls for great preparation and invites us to give the rest of our lives to Jesus as well. We must first receive forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Confession is a valuable preparation and churches provide times in advance as we prepare for communion. *Check parishes for scheduled times for confession. If you can't make these times, contact one of the following: Fr. Robert 374-9504; Fr. Ross 474-9032; Fr. Tom 452-3533; or Fr. Welcome 488-2595.*

Confession isn't the only requirement for receiving the Sacrament of Holy Eucharist. The Sacrament of Baptism must have been received as well. A child, or any person, who is not baptized cannot receive communion.

St. Mother Teresa also has words for you and your family: "Jesus has made Himself the Bread of Life to give us life. Night and day, He is there. **If you really want to grow in love, come back to the Eucharist...**"
